inflation levels and we most likely know someone


who is struggling.



# Development and Peace – Cancel Debt to Create Hope:

As we continue our journey for the **2025 Jubilee**, it was Pope Francis who reminded us that "hope should be granted to the billions of the poor who often lack the essentials of life" and that "the goods of the Earth are not destined for a privileged few but for



everyone." (Spes Non Confundit, 15-16)

This week we received an update from our Maritime Regional Animator, Adah Ogbe, regarding the Bishops' (CCCB) Pastoral Letter on Jubilee, Debt and Economic **Justice.** On July 25, the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops issued an important pastoral letter on the Jubilee, debt and economic justice. Observing that over 3 billion people live in countries that spend more on paying the interest on their loans than either healthcare or education, the Bishops explain that our international financial system is unjust, holds back development, and locks many countries into a cycle of unfair borrowing. The Bishops advise not only cancelling unjust and unpayable debt but also finding the ambition to address the structural problems in the financial system that lead to debt crises. The Government of Canada, the Bishops add, should "become a global leader on debt justice." The letter also highlights Pope Francis's recognition of the "ecological debt" owed by the Global North to the Global South.

In this Jubilee Year, "Catholics in Canada once again have an opportunity to raise our voices for debt relief and justice." The Bishops have trusted Development and Peace – Caritas Canada to help Canadians connect with a global movement for debt justice in this Jubilee Year. Please join our <u>Turn</u> <u>Debt into Hope campaign</u>, beginning with <u>signing the global</u> petition for debt justice.

Saint Francis of Assisi Shrine in Skiff Lake (St. John the Baptist Parish). Annual Shrine Mass, Sunday, August 10<sup>th</sup> 2025, 11am.

12:15pm: Picnic Lunch: You may bring a bag lunch or there will be a canteen open for sandwiches, sweets, hot dogs,

All are welcome to join in this Spiritual Journey. Bring a lawn chair and enjoy the day. The event takes place rain or shine.

(Directions: Civic address is 413 Upper Skiff Lake Road. For driving directions: take Exit 212 at Meductic, turn on to Route 122 towards Canterbury. Take Mill Street to Upper Skiff Lake Road, follow the signs or drive on Route 122 to just past Skiff Lake, turn right onto the Upper Skiff Lake Road, follow the signs.)

**DESCRIPTION OF HISTORIC PLACE:** The Shrine to Saint Francis of Assisi is comprised of a small 19th-century wood frame chapel situated in an isolated spot within a pastoral setting. With the shrine and its collection of religious statues and artefacts.

The Shrine to Saint Francis of Assisi was designated a Provincial Historic Site to commemorate the construction of a place of worship by Irish Catholic settlers of the area circa 1865. The Shrine to Saint Francis of Assisi is also recognized for commemorating the 17th-century Franciscan Mission to the Wolastoqiyik people. Originally named after St. Joseph, in 1923 the chapel was dedicated to Saint Francis of Assisi, to celebrate relations between the Franciscans and Wolastoqiyik people.

This location still is a place of devotion and pilgrimage and holds significant religious import to Wolastoqiyik peoples and others of the Catholic faith. Credited with healing the sick and infirmed for almost a century, the Shrine to Saint Francis of Assisi is the site of an annual Pilgrimage on Shrine Sunday, the second Sunday of August. # OUR SACRED STORIES Our Quest for God Among Us (Fr. John Jennings)

Have you ever been lost or needed some direction? A map is a big help in finding the route to our destination. But a map is only helpful if I know roughly where I am now. Even if I am getting directions from someone else by phone, I still need to know my starting point if the directions the person offers are to be helpful.

As in finding our way on a road, the Gospel reading for this 19<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time (Luke 12:32-48) becomes much clearer when we put it into context, that is, where we have been over the past few Sundays in Luke's Gospel.

Two weeks ago, on the 17<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time, we heard Jesus's disciples ask him to teach them how to pray. In response Jesus gave them what has become our Christian prayer: The Our Father (Luke 11:1-13). Our God is a parent who loves us unconditionally. This prayer acknowledges that we live in a close and loving relationship with God. This is beyond our wildest dreams, for God will never stop loving us. By way of prayer, Jesus calls his disciples to accept that God is our parent – the one who creates, gives and sustains life for all humanity.

On the 18<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Ordinary Time, in Luke's Gospel (12:13-21) calls on his disciples to set their priorities, not on things, stuff, but on the relationship with this loving God. As well, like any loving parent our relationship with our parent-God is to be reflected in our relationships with others, with one another and with all humanity. With this context we come to a continuation of Luke's Gospel (Luke 12:32-48).

Luke's words are a call for readiness and openness to the many encounters we have with God. Jesus uses a story of servants waiting for their master to return. When, after a long wait he does come back, he surprises the servants. The master sits them down and serves them a meal. What a wonderful image, a surprising image of God's love. God reaches out to us where we are and brings life to us where we are. Our quest is to find God already with us.

More than 1500 years ago, one of our Christian saints wrote an account of his search for God. St.

Augustine, a bishop in north Africa described his conversion in what was a spiritual autobiography. In his *Confessions* X,38 he related not his finding of God, but how God found him. Augustine came to realise that God had always been there with him and for him. These are Augustine's words: Late have I loved You, O ancient of days, yet ever new! Late I loved You. And behold, You were within me and I was outside. There I searched for You, among things outside.... You were with me, but I was not with You.... You called and

burst my deafness. Your light shone and scattered my darkness.... You touched me and I burned for Your peace.

In faith and in community, we discover that our relationship with our loving God leads us to be open to encounters - moments and experiences when God walks into our lives. Such readiness means we are prepared to hear God's voice in the voices of those around us. We are prepared to see God's face in the faces of those around us, and to experience God's loving presence in the creation that surrounds us. Emmanuel – God with us, always.

Jesus reveals our God as not aloof and distant. When we are ready and prepared and open, we can recognize God in the moments of our lives when friends and family show acts and speak words of love and care. We encounter God in the stranger who expresses kindness. We encounter God in the compassion of one human being to another. God enters our lives in the wonder of creation and in the warmth of human love. God's presence and action in our lives often will be unexpected. As Luke tells us and Augustine discovered: "Be ready, for the Son of Man [expression of God's presence] is coming at an unexpected hour."
