World Day of Prayer 2026: An international ecumenical Christian laywomen's initiative that shares the hopes, concerns and prayers of women from around the globe. **World Day of Prayer (WDP)** is celebrated annually in over 170 countries on the first Friday in March. This year's date is **Friday, March 6th**.

This year's service and reflections have been prepared by our sisters in Nigeria with the theme, "**I will give you rest, come.**" from Matthew 11:28-30. In a time in our world when heavy burdens are being felt daily by so many, our Nigerian sisters offer profound insights into finding rest in God. As outlined in the resources this year, "...through their exploration of different kinds of burdens, shame, systemic oppression, religious persecution, poverty and despair, they help us to understand both the weight of human suffering and the depths of divine rest. Their work shows us that true rest isn't just about physical relief, but about transformation through God's grace and community support."



This year's artistic work is entitled '**Rest for the Weary**' by Gift Amarachi Ottah a final-year Mass Communication student at Alex Ekwueme Federal

University Ndufu-Alike in Ebonyi State and draws inspiration from her home state of Abia in Nigeria. Following her family's tradition in creative arts and printing, Gift has developed a unique artistic voice that speaks to the struggles and strength of Nigerian women. She was motivated to design this artwork for the 2026 World Day of Prayer program because of the burdens that Nigerian women are facing. She hopes that her art will help to amplify their voices.

The **theme song** for this year's service, "Come Unto Me" written especially for World Day of Prayer by Chisom R. Chukwumerije and is sung in English and Igbo. The song invites those who are weary and oppressed to find comfort and rest in God.

The first session took place on **Thursday, February 12th (introduction session and book distribution) at 7pm at Holy Family Church.** Continued

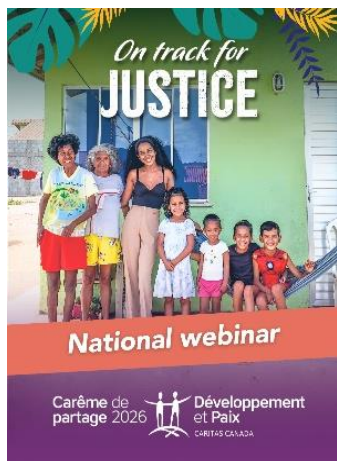

Coldest Night of the Year Fundraiser: On **February 28th 2026**, the Confirmation Class from St. Kateri Tekakwitha Parish will be walking in the Coldest Night of the Year, a fun, family-friendly walkathon

to raise money to support the John Howard Society of Fredericton and their work with people in our community experiencing hurt, hunger and homelessness.

The John Howard Society of Fredericton (JHSF) runs a variety of programs for youth and adults in our community to help them make better life decisions and lead happy and productive lives. JHSF owns five residential buildings, scattered across Fredericton, that provide supportive housing for 58 individuals who were previously experiencing homelessness, including five youth between 19 and 24 years of age. Residents all have a case manager who helps them with personal challenges in their lives.

They also have access to peer support and a mental health and addictions worker. Other services provided include:

- support youth in crisis with housing and supports,
- provide inclement weather response during times of extreme heat or cold to people experiencing homelessness and living rough,
- provide snacks and beverages to people experiencing homelessness who are clients of our Ironwood Resource Centre,
- deliver family programs to help kids do better in school,
- provide a lunch snack program to kids in need/provide breakfast to our shelter clients,
- run our peer support group that is free to anyone in the community who needs support in the topic areas of mental health, addictions, homelessness, grief and loss,
- cover some of the construction costs of our new family housing units for families experiencing homelessness due to domestic violence, and much more.

OUR SACRED STORIES

Our Community of Living Faith: A Path to Liberation and New Life (Fr. John Jennings)

Ten years ago, in 2016, Pope Francis proclaimed a jubilee year. The Jubilee took as its theme and focus: Jesus as the face of God's mercy. With this theme, our Church, both globally and locally is called to be the "Face of Jesus' Mercy" in our world. With mercy there is a call for openness to one and all. Through this open and inviting love and mercy, the Christian community is the face of a God who loves all freely and openly.

The call to open and liberating mercy is seen in Jesus throughout the Gospels. It is found again in the deliberations and documents the Second Vatican Council (1962-65). Looking back to that Council, Pope Francis

remarked on the vision it expressed: *With the Council, the Church entered a new phase in her history.*

[The Council] *perceived as a breath of the Holy Spirit, a need to talk about God to men and women of their time in a more accessible way.* What was expressed then and continues to be revealed now is that we are to be a Church not of judgement and condemnation. We are a Church of reconciliation and healing, with an open door to welcome all.

Our faith tradition is intended to be a path to liberation and new life. It is not a narrow path by which our personal salvation is guaranteed. Rather, it is an outreach to the whole of life and human existence, aimed at bringing all of creation together in a manner by which we become the creation of God's dream. We find it expressed in the very early poetic words of the Old Testament Book of Genesis: *God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good (1:31).*

The gospel writer Matthew, saw this as the direction in which Jesus was leading his disciples. He captured this core teaching in the Sermon on the Mount (Matt 5-7). After introducing this core with the Beatitudes and using the images of salt and light for the role of his disciples, Matthew honours the Judaic Law of Moses. But he warns that if we do not go further than the scribes and Pharisees who honoured the Law literally and strictly, we have fallen short. More is called for (Matt 5:17-37).

Jesus, and his teachings are the new Law for his disciples. This new law is not mere rules and rituals, it is a way of life. This life is in imitation of the Master. It is a way of living that brings compassion and love, healing and peace. One can say that at the center of Christianity is not the law or the rituals or even the scriptures, but a person and that this person is Jesus the Christ. He it is who, in word and action, reveals the everlasting love of God. This is our center.

Globally and locally, the challenge is to discover that we can reveal mercy and welcome to all, especially the outcasts and marginalized in our midst. We face this challenge as church, as a community of faith. There are many areas of our relationships with one another and with our world where mercy and love to all is a difficult path. Is our compassion sufficient and open enough to welcome all? How open are we to all who have for so long been outcasts? To the poor and homeless, to gay persons and the divorced in our churches, to all the lost and ones who come to our door. How ready are we to recognize that we are one Church and though we many have a variety of roles and all are honoured, women and men, young and old, all are called to the same discipleship, equally.

When Pope Francis proclaimed the jubilee year in 2016, he stated: *The church's very credibility is seen in how she shows merciful and compassionate love ("The Face of Mercy" 10).* Our very identity lies not in meticulous observance of law and ritual, but in our love, compassion, mercy and inclusivity.
