Saint John Chrysostom (c.347-407) Patron of Lecturers, public speakers & preachers

Saint John Chrysostom was born in Antioch, he studied the Greek classics and was trained as an orator. He left his studies and began to study the ascetic live, prayer and scripture. He was baptized and underwent a profound conversion which led him to a life of great solitude and prayer.

He joined a community of hermits in 374 and began rigorous fasting, penance and a continual study of the Bible to the point of having memorized a good portion of it. Because of this he became well versed in the Bible. After several years his health began to deteriorate and he returned to Antioch to regain his health back.

Ordained in 386, he wrote many sermons and commentaries and was famous for his eloquent sermons. These contained dogmatic, moral and historical teachings from the early church. Appointed Archbishop of Constantinople in 398. Even though his position gave him power and wealth he lived a simple life and cared for the poor.

He preached on moral and spiritual guidance and against materialism of the imperial court and against pagan activities. Because of his preaching he made enemies in very high places and was exiled on more that one occasion. The last was complete banishment from the Roman Empire.

After his death because of his powerful preaching, he received the title "Chrysostomos" (golden mouth). He also left behind around 700 sermons, close to 250 letters, as well as commentaries on Scripture and important teachings on the Eucharist. His homilies, for the most part, held emphasis on care for the poor. His best-known homily, though quite short, was the Paschal Homily.

Prayer Saint John Chrysostom, we pray for the strength to follow the example of your unwavering faith. Please intercede for us and guide us in our spiritual journeys and may we be filled with your compassion and your love. Saint John Chrysostom, pray for us. Jesus, we trust in you. Amen.

Fasting Try giving up social media on Fridays in Lent <u>or</u> maybe make a point on Fridays to watch YouTube videos created by Fr. Mike Schmitz, Fr. Mark Goring, Fr. Columba Jordan and Catholic Women Preach. They are not long videos but are very informative about the Catholic faith in a relaxed manner.

Almsgiving Saint John Chrysostom constantly preached about helping the poor and needy. Try donating food, clothing or time to organizations who help clothe feed and assist those in need and if that is beyond your ability at this time then say a special prayer that they will receive what they need to sustain them.



Development and Peace Share Lent Campaign: Denouncing oil pollution in Nigeria



Nigeria is Africa's largest economy and biggest oil producer. Despite oil exports worth billions of dollars, millions of Nigerians remain in poverty and face food insecurity. In the south, pollution and contamination by the oil industry are causing great hardship.

Development and Peace — Caritas

Canada's partner Health of Mother Earth Foundation (HOMEF) works on issues of climate justice, food sovereignty and oil pollution. HOMEF defends farmers' rights and helps protect their lands from pollution and contamination by the oil industry in southern Nigeria.

"This cassava (pictured above) has been planted for over a year, but there has been no yield and now the roots have decayed in the soil. When the river oerflows due to poor drainage, it affects the farm. When the water leaves, the oil remains on the farmland. Our aquatic life is gone. I wonder what will happen for the generations to come."

"After more than six decades of reckless, mindless, irresponsible, oil and gas extraction, communities are struggling for survival. It's about regaining land for farming; it's about getting clean water for fishing and for potable use; it's about regaining their dignity. It's a struggle for the right to life." -Nnimmo Basey, Executive Director, HOMEF.

"In the past, farming was easy. My mother was a farmer. She used to have good harvests of cassava, cocoyam, and plantain. Now on our farm, the cassava is dying. When we uproot it, we notice the sheen of oil. We face health challenges; houses filled with cracks from extractive activities; and a poor water system, among many other challenges." -Akpanikan Felix, Okoro-Utip Indigenous farmer.

Our Sacred Stories Going to the Mountain – Visions & Dreams (Fr. John Jennings)

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. There he was transfigured before them....

Every year on the Second Sunday of Lent we listen to the story of the *transfiguration*. This year we hear the account as told by the Gospel writer Mark. *Transfiguration* is not a common word for us, but it does describe something that is quite often part of our experience. *Transfiguration* expresses change, transformation. It describes someone showing a different side or image of themselves. On that "high mountain apart, by themselves" this is what Mark describes happened for those three disciples. They had a vision of who Jesus is.

But *Transfiguration* also involves self-discovery. The experience shows the disciples beginning to see who they are. It reveals a transformation in their own lives. Accepting this change is more than taking on something new. It also involves a letting go of who they have been and accepting that their lives have in fact changed. New vision will always have this result and this challenge.

This is a story of vision. Peter and James and John have a vision. They glimpse Jesus in radiant light, expressing the presence of God in their midst. He is accompanied by the prophets Elijah and by Moses who led God's People into covenant with God and brought them from slavery to liberation. These were the twin pillars of the faith of Israel in God – the law and the prophets. The vision of Peter, James and John now brought them to see this faith fulfilled in Jesus.

Jesus is the power of God revealed in human flesh. What Mark presents as happening to these disciples on that mountain acknowledges the faith of Christians down through the ages. Jesus reveals the Spirit of God showered upon humanity. It is a vision of God's dream for us, what we can be.

This Sunday which focuses on the *transfiguration* is sometimes referred to as the "day of dreams." As the Gospel writer anticipates the resurrection, God's dream for creation and for all humanity is revealed in Jesus, the risen one. It is a dream of life and of light, of healing and reconciliation, of liberation and renewal. It is a dream of transformation, shown in the *transfiguration* that the disciples experienced on the mountain.

The transfiguration is not only about Jesus. The vision is also about the disciples and their mission. And, it is about us and the way of life we are called to imitate. It is about our own transformation and becoming. Whether we realize it or not, following in the steps of Jesus and blessed

with the Spirit, we are meant to transform and transfigure all creation. In our own time and world, our mission is to transform our relationships, our Church, our community and our world.

This is quite a vision and it has all kinds of risks and challenges for us, as it had for Jesus. But what a dream, what a vision for our world! It is our glory and salvation – A world transformed, *transfigured*. Getting there will involve many challenges – from taking on something new and also, letting go of what has been our world. We are to bring life out of suffering and death, liberation out of bondage and injustice, healing out of division and hurt for all.

Our Church is currently working to grow as a dynamic, synodal Church. The next session of the Synod will occur in October. Around the world we are all asked to reflect on this question: "HOW can we be a synodal Church in Mission?" In this transformation, are we open to the new and ready to let go of what has been?
