Household items for Yorsalim and Dawit – Dawit Maherai was sponsored by St. Kateri in 2021. He fled from Eritrea over 10 years ago. Many thousands of young people did



the same to escape being drafted into the Eritrean army, where they would have to serve for an indefinite time, at little or no pay. What chance would they have to have a family if they stayed?

Since arriving in Fredericton, Dawit (which means 'David') has worked in food service and in food delivery, after he got a license and car. This March he is confirmed to begin training on an apprenticeship in Carpentry. He is excited!

Last year Dawit travelled to Ethiopia, which is next to Eritrea. There he could safely meet up with his family for the first time since fleeing Eritrea, AND marry the young woman whom he has been courting online in recent years. Her name is Yorsalim, which means 'Jerusalem'. An application to bring Yorsalim to Canada is well-advanced, just waiting for IRCC (Immigration Canada) to finalize it. She could be here in a few months, since Family reunification applications are processed much more quickly than most others.

They want to rent an apartment, of course, and need all the usual stuff to set up house. They already have a lot of items from a St. Kateri parishioner who was decluttering recently. We are looking for lightly-used items. Things like linens should be next-to-new or new.



## Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (January 18<sup>th</sup>-25<sup>th</sup>)

This year is the 1700<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first Christian Ecumenical Council in Nicaea near Constantinople, and to mark this special anniversary the Nicene Creed is included as part of the Order of Worship for services held during this week of prayer. "Christians can pray together because they have a shared understanding of who God is and one version of this is found in the Nicene Creed." (Anglican Church of Canada)

Reflections this year were prepared by the monastic community of Bose in Northern Italy. The theme for this week of prayer is "Do You Believe This?" and is drawn from the Gospel of John 11:26. This challenging question is asked of Martha by Jesus, following the death of her brother Lazarus, who had been dead for four days before Jesus arrives in Bethany. Martha is distressed and believes her brother would not have died if Jesus has come sooner. Take time this week to reflect on the entire dialogue between Martha and Jesus by reading John 11:17-27.

- What feelings or emotions did you notice in this passage?
- What lessons can we learn from both Martha and Jesus?
- Ask yourself, "Do You Believe This?"

Lord Jesus who prayed that all might be one, we pray to you for the unity of all Christians according to your will. May your spirit enable us to experience the suffering caused by our failures, and to hope beyond all hope. Amen." (WCPU)

# Our Sacred Stories A Wedding, Wine and God's Compassion: Vision with Faith (Fr. John Jennings)

"They have no wine." This is the simple comment of the mother of Jesus at a wedding they were attending. In the story as John tells it becomes much more than a simple observation by the mother of Jesus. (John 2:1-11) It is a revelation of the divine presence expressed in Jesus. At first we might think that this revelation takes place through a wondrous act. Jesus changes water into wine for the wedding feast. This is reading the story on the surface. We might call it the physical meaning of the action. But for John, and for us, there is a much deeper meaning. The Gospel writer comments that this action was "the first of his signs."

John relates many such stories in his Gospel. Each of the stories can be read superficially and it describes an action of Jesus that is remarkable. If we stop there, we will miss the deeper meaning to which the Gospel writer is really leading us with these stories. We are called to read more deeply and see the sign in the story.

In the Gospel of John, these stories present us with signs, signs that reveal.

Through the eyes of faith, we discover who Jesus is, the incarnation of God, present among us. To see this reality in the stories means reading with faith. Faith allows a deeper, spiritual meaning, beyond surface. Through faith, we discover the sign and the sign takes us beyond the action itself, wondrous or miraculous as it might be.

At the wedding in Cana, Jesus, his mother and his disciples attended. His mother saw a need, a lack, at the feast – "They have no wine." It was this need or lack that allowed Jesus to enter the story. It was this entrance into an occasion of need or lack that reveals the meaning of God's presence with us.

Throughout John's Gospel we find many such occasions when in the face of a need or lack, the compassionate love of God is revealed. This story is one of them.

We see it again when a royal official appealed for Jesus' help for his sick child. (John 4:48).

It appears again when Jesus was asked for help by a blind beggar (John 9:25). Again it is revealed as Jesus responds to the Martha and Mary whose brother Lazarus is dying. (John 11:3)

All these stories hit us first as wondrous actions. But the fuller, more significant meaning lies deeper. They are signs for us of a loving and compassionate God. This is what the incarnation is all about. It reveals that God has come among us in a divine-human connection, Jesus the Christ. And, God has done this out of God's boundless and unconditional love – for all humanity.

John is explicit in expressing this: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son.... God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him." (John 3:16-17)

John's story of a wedding and wine reaches far beyond a social embarrassment and even beyond a wondrous action. The presence of Jesus at the wedding as well as in John's other stories, forms revealing vision that God's compassionate love is present in all the lacks and needs of our humanity. This is God's compassion and mercy come among us.

Can our personal, life stories reveal our faith in this loving God of compassion and mercy?
