Development and Peace: *Turn Debt into Hope*: SIGN THE PETITION!



Our Partners Make the Difference. Peru faces an ecological debt crisis as extractive industries, often foreign owned, deplete its natural resources, harm the environment and human rights. These industries unjustly

enrich the Global North at the Global South's expense. Our partners, the Comisión Episcopal de Acción Social (CEAS, Episcopal Commission for Social Action) and the Institut Bartolomé de Las Casas (IBC) work closely with affected communities, advocating for justice and sustainable alternatives.

"Our territory is under concession without our consent. The extractive companies want to move our territory to get the oil, damaging places like the *ojos de agua* (eyes of water). These water sources are vital to us, the Asháninka, providing water not only for us for but for other species. This economic model is not ours as Indigenous peoples; it distances us from Mother Nature and our spirituality." – Karen Pamela Huere Cristobal, Indigenous Asháninka activist, Peru

What can you do this week? As Pilgrims of Hope in this Jubilee Year, let's journey together during the 40-days of Lent. The mini-magazine which is available in the lobby of the church offers some suggestions for this week from the Solidarity Calendar:

- March 16<sup>th</sup> is the Second Sunday of Lent, and the symbol is 'a pencil and clipboard' encouraging everyone to <u>SIGN THE</u> <u>PETITION</u> to cancel debt and break the debt cycle (available at the back of the church).
- Pray for our sisters and brothers who are weighed down by heavy burdens of debt.
- A challenge: Pick one meal this week to be made entirely of locally grown ingredients. This is especially tricky in the winter!
- March 22<sup>nd</sup> is World Water Day. Water is essential to life, so let's take care to not waste it. Google "The Story of Bottled Water."

In this Jubilee Year, Pope Francis calls on us to take part in the global *Turn Debt into Hope* campaign to *"forgive the debts* of countries that will never be able to repay them." Knowing that 3.3 billion people live in countries that spend more on foreign debt repayment than on health or education, we must act!

SIGN THE GLOBAL PETITION calling for: Canceling unjust and unsustainable debts; reforming the global financial system to prioritize people and the planet; and establishing a binding and comprehensive debt framework within the United Nations. Please sign the petition at the entrance of the church or online at devp.org/debt. ## An opportunity for Adult Faith Formation in our

Parish: The Parish Survey (the Disciple Maker Index) results indicated a strong desire of adults in the parish for opportunities to learn about their faith, discuss their faith and connect with others on the faith journey. In response, there will be six evening sessions for Adults scheduled between January 21st and into the Easter Season. These sessions will be 90 minutes in length and will each have a theme. You are welcome to attend any or all of these events. There will be input on a particular 'theme' or 'aspect' of our faith followed by an opportunity for small groups to have conversation. This is for those who are newly inquiring about the Catholic Faith or those who want to learn more and deepen their faith journey. The next session is **Thursday, March 27**<sup>th</sup> @ 7pm: 'Easter Triduum'. Session led by Fr. Bill. Triduum is taken from a Latin root that means "three days" and is celebrated as one great feast. It is a period that traces the final days of Jesus' life, his death, and his resurrection from the dead. Starting with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Thursday evening, The Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday and the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday evening or Easter Sunday Mass.

# Our Sacred Stories Transfiguration: Seeing with the Eyes of Faith (Fr. John Jennings)

The Second Sunday of Lent each year takes us to an episode in the Gospels that is referred to as the *transfiguration*. Peter, James and John go up on a mountain (or a hill) with Jesus. There, Jesus is *transfigured* before them. This story appears in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke. This year we hear Luke's version. (Luke 9:28-36) What is this all about?

The story of the *transfiguration* is one of those Gospel accounts that recognizes Jesus' relationship with the Father and the mission he has been given. It is an expression of how the disciples saw Jesus after the resurrection. The Gospel writers relate it at this point as a foreshadowing of the faith of the post-resurrection Christian communities. In short, it was seeing through the eyes of faith.

Christian faith calls us to see ourselves through the eyes of faith. At our baptism we are given the promise of eternal and risen life. At the same time we are called to be disciples of Jesus and to share the mission that Jesus had to build the Reign of God in the midst of our world.

As we listen to the Gospel story of the *transfiguration* we might note two elements of Luke's account. First, we can notice Peter's immediate response to the event. He wants to remain on that mountain. The experience is so satisfying that he does not want it to end. But, end it must, he and the other disciples have a mission. What the experience, what they see through the eyes of faith, is not just for them. They must share the Good News. This can only happen if they come down from the mountain, with Jesus to build the Reign of God in the world.

The second element focuses their eyes of faith on Jesus himself. They must recognize the special relationship that Jesus has with the Father. They must see him as the Son, the chosen one.

As they do this they then must listen to him. In listening, truly listening in faith, they will grasp the message of the Good News. It is a message of love and hope for all humanity and it is in sharing this that they will be disciples of Jesus. These eyes of faith are our own. They allow us to do as the disciples were called to on that mountain. Like them we have a call to discipleship. With our eyes of faith we begin to see that we have a special relationship with Jesus and through Jesus to the Father. We are truly God's People, the adopted daughters and sons of God, beloved and cherished by our God who is parent to us. Spiritual writer, Megan McKenna describes how this affects all disciples: "The transfiguration story is a way of life that we are called to imitate." (*Lent: The Sunday Readings* 81)

As God's beloved people, we have a call to our world and all humanity. The Good News that we recognize through the eyes of faith is the message we take to our world. All humanity is seen as God's holy people. All our world is God's sacred gift, and we are called to cherish and care for this creation we have been given. As Jesus was *transfigured* to reveal the glory of God present to the disciples, so we are to reflect this same glory of God in ourselves and to see it in all creation.
