World Mission Month: During October we are invited to journey together as 'Missionaries of Hope Among all Peoples', which is the theme for this year's World Mission Month. To assist us on our journey, we are encouraged to use Missio's Minute Missions, a collection of short prayers, inspiring reflections and some small actions we can undertake daily as we prepare for World Mission Sunday next weekend.

Often when we hear the word 'mission' or 'missionary', we tend to think about travelling to far off places or undergoing some sort of special training. In another sense, it can also mean discovering the missionary within ourselves and how our actions can benefit our communities and the world around us. But how can we discover this? We may find some inspiration in the words of St. Thérèse of Lisieux, "Miss no single opportunity of making some small sacrifice, here by a smiling look, there by a kindly word, always doing the smallest thing right and doing it all for love."

Below are some prayer reflections and activities provided to us by this week's *Minute Missions*:

St. John Henry Newman: "God has created me to some definite service and committed some work to me which has not been committed to another. I have my mission.

Minute Mission-Reflect: Each of us has a mission in the world. Find a quiet moment this week to ask yourself: How am I taking part in God's mission and how can I share my gifts and blessings."

Activities for the third week of Mission Month:

- October 12th is the Feast of St. Carlo Acutis.
 Learn about his mission to share God's love through modern technology.
- Make a special effort to be a missionary of God's love with everyone you meet this week.
- Say the Lord's Prayer for missionaries who help children in places of conflict.
- Sit somewhere quiet and thank God for all the good things that happened this week.

This day of prayer, solidarity and giving invites us to share the Good News of God's love which has the power to transform lives and heal our world. Our Sacred Stories Spirituality: Holiness, Wholeness and Healing (Fr. John Jennings)

This weekend we hear two stories of healing...and more. The first story tells of healing the leprosy of a Syrian general, Naaman, by the prophet Elisha (2 Kgs 5:14-17). The second story relates how Jesus heals ten lepers, one of whom is a Samaritan not a Jew (Lk 17:11-19). Leprosy was an isolating disease. It made a person an outcast from the community who stood back in fear of it.

For the person who struggled with the affliction it left them with a humanity that was wounded and broken, physically, but also emotionally and socially. They were broken in body, but perhaps more significantly in spirit and in heart. Their relationships with family, friends and community were fractured. In our own times leprosy is sometimes seen as an image for the isolation and brokenness that is often part of the human experience. Someone who is excluded is often referred to as "being treated as a leper."

The healing that the prophet Elisha gave to the Syrian, Naaman and that Jesus offered to the ten lepers was more than a healing of the body. It was a healing of the spirit and heart. It returned the broken ones to the fullness of community. In the case of the ten lepers in the Gospel, they were to go the priests who would certify that they were healed and eligible to return to the community. In the story from the Book of Kings, Naaman, a Gentile had a spiritual relationship brought forward in his life as he turned to the God of Israel. Their exclusion has ended.

We all yearn for the wholeness in life that the lepers experienced in their healing. Who is without wounds, whether physical, emotional or social? Who does not long for the closeness of relationship that brings inclusion, care and expression of love? The story of Naaman and the ten lepers is the story of every human being.

We may not have the disease of leprosy, but our lives are marked by a leprosy of spirit in many ways. At the same time we are also marked by the healing that we see in these two accounts. We long for the wholeness that comes from this healing. We call this wholeness *holiness*.

Holiness is sometimes confused with what we might call religiosity. That is, following a strict pattern of belief or rules of a church. In fact, holiness comes from a sense of God's constant and loving presence with us. It is about a relationship that is vital and active. This relationship is both personal and communal. It cannot be lived alone, taking no other persons into account. And it cannot be real and living if it does not reach out and touch our world with care and concern. In short holiness is always inclusive and caring.

Holiness is actually the wholeness for which we all long. It is the gift of vitality and meaning that helps us to make sense out of our lives. Holiness draws us into a healthy and lively relationship with a God who loves and cares about us. It also draws us into healthy and life-giving relationships with others. Holiness is fullest when lived within a community with whom we can share our experience. It flows from a sense of the spirit, a spirituality that is lived amid our ordinary lives and shared with a community of others on the same journey of life.
