Season of Creation:

October 4th not only marks the end of the *Season of Creation* but recognizes the **Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi.** Long

before he was formally recognized as the Patron Saint of Ecology by Pope John Paul II in 1979, this humble Saint was well known for his love of nature and interconnectedness with all of God's Creation. In an excerpt from St. Francis' Canticle of the Sun, he reminds us that it is Sister Earth who supports us: "We praise you, Lord, for Sister Earth, who sustains us with her fruits, colored flowers, and herbs. We praise and bless you, Lord and give you thanks and serve you in all humility." His life can be best defined as follows:

Sisterhood and Brotherhood with Nature: He often referred to animals and other elements of the earth as "Sister Mother Earth", "Brother Wind", and "Sister Water".

A Life of Simplicity and Harmony: Early on in life Saint Francis relinquished his wealth and instead lived a life of poverty and service to others all the while living in harmony with nature.

Love for All Creation: From the creatures of the earth to the smallest of plants to the stars in the night sky, Saint Francis believed in the interconnectedness of God's creation.

A Model for Environmentalism: His teachings and the way he lived his life reflected our responsibility to care for Mother Earth and all her inhabitants; not as consumers and exploiters but as good stewards.

As we seek balance with Mother Earth with respect and honor let us continue to strive to become better stewards of God's Creation. May we continue to pray in gratitude for the beauty of creation.

Our Great Stories Faith: Small is Great (Fr. John Jennings)

Faith the size of a mustard seed – what an image Jesus uses as he responds to his disciples! They ask him to increase their faith. Faced with what they hear are the demands of discipleship, they feel inadequate, too limited in their ability to respond to his call. His response is to tell them that they do not need *more* faith (Luke 17:5-10). What they need is to recognize the power of *small* faith.

This *small* faith is with us in so many ways. It marks our lives and allows us to make sense ourselves, to recognize who we are. Such faith seems so ordinary that we take it for granted and forget its significance. Often, we limit "faith" to belief. It is much broader. Faith is at the core of all our relationships. It is the trust with which we live our lives.

Two great circles of relationship dominate much of our lives. The first is our relationships with one another, the second is how we relate to our environment, the world, the creation in which we live. Our peace and contentment are dependent on these two clusters of relationships. Relationships are blessings, the delight that God has in each of us and all creation.

Our many specific relationships are a reflection of our relationship with God, the source of our life and the foundation of our capacity to love. It is in these two circles that we live out our relationship with our God. The major support for each of them is what we refer to as faith, the willingness and capacity to have a life that looks beyond ourselves and to trust in another.

It is quite striking to witness a couple who are getting married. For all the excitement and the many plans and preparations that surround a wedding, it is something more that creates the wonder of what is happening. The couple pledges love to one another "in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health", and they promise this for the rest of their lives. What makes this possible is their bond of love. With this love, they can hold each other in trust, with a faith in each other no matter what may come their way. True friendships are based on such trust and faith.

The bond of relational love is what Pope Francis's Encyclical on Climate Change and Inequality (Laudato Si 2015) expresses. He sees the commitment we make to all creation in this light. Humanity together shares creation as "our common home". In his final prayer, the pope appeals to all for the sake of all: Touch the hearts of those who look only for gain at the expense of the poor and the earth. Teach us to discover the worth of each thing, to be filled with awe and contemplation, to recognize that we are profoundly united with every creature. The call for peace, justice and care for creation founded on our relationships with God and with one another in our common home.

Discipleship is a call to faith and courage. In the Gospels we hear of those who began to follow Jesus. When they did so, they did so in faith, trusting in this person who was calling and leading them. Sharing the mission of Jesus is to live in faith, trusting in the relationships that come with it – with God who gives us life, with Jesus who blesses our humanity, with one another as we work together and with all creation, God's great gift and the reflection of God's love.

The gift faith is always about our relationships and how we live them. Following the model given us by Jesus, we find ourselves called to listen, to respond, to reach out in love in a messy, often wounded world. This brings reconciliation and healing to our brokenness and the brokenness of all creation. Faith the size of a mustard seed – what a difference it can make in all of life!
